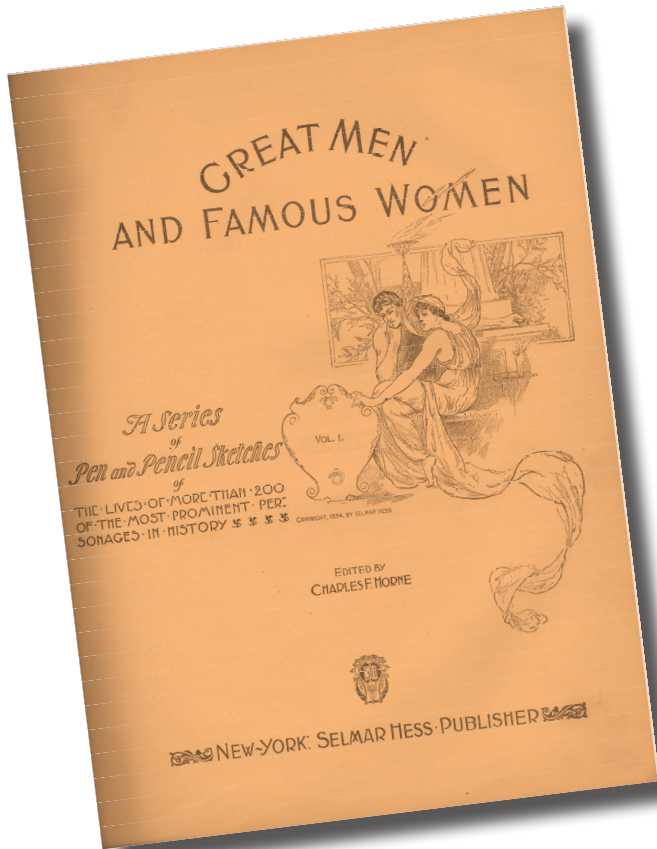

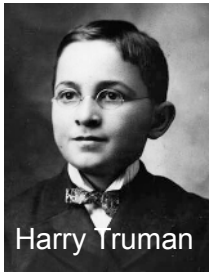

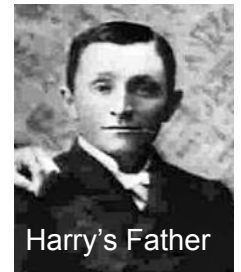
Tell the Truth

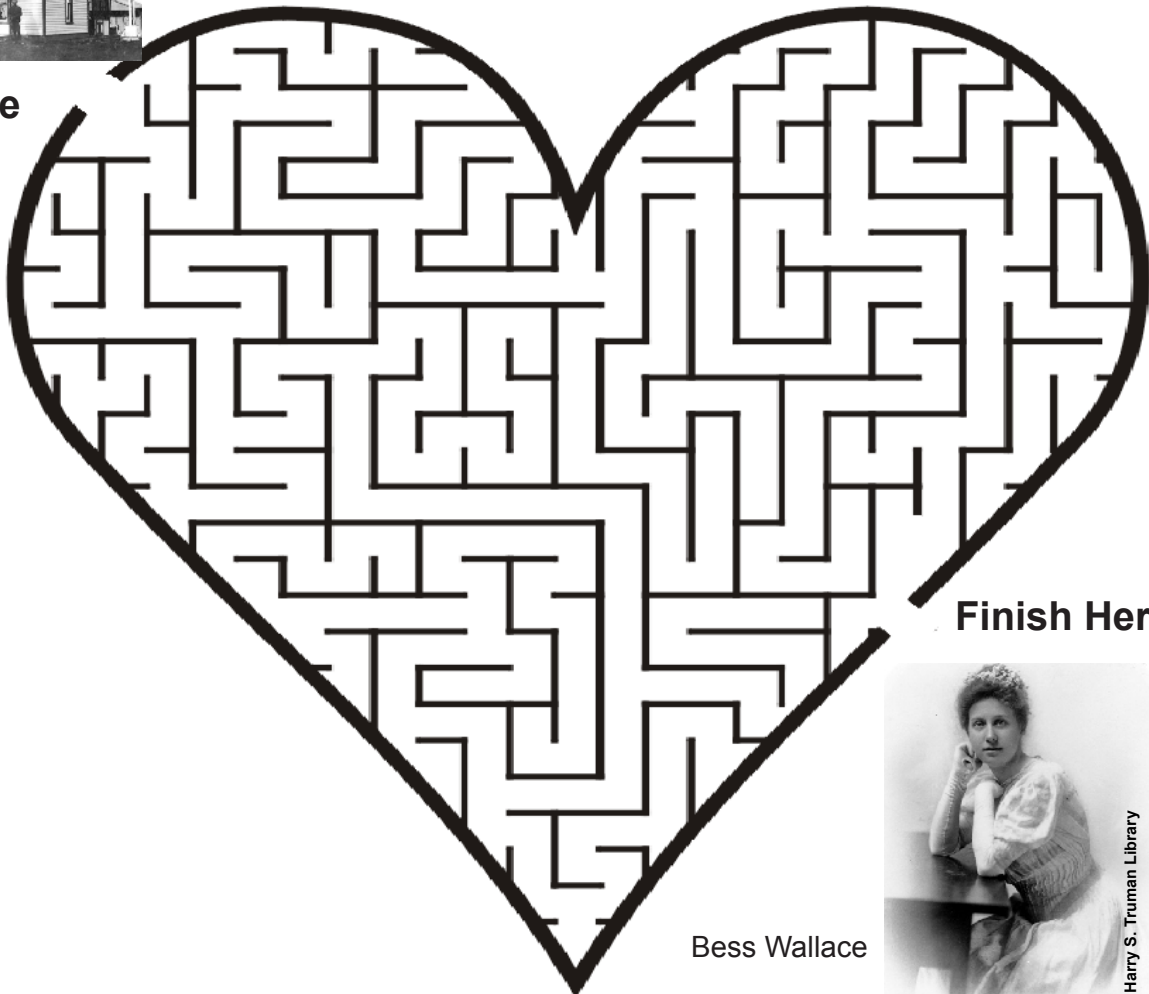

Have Patience

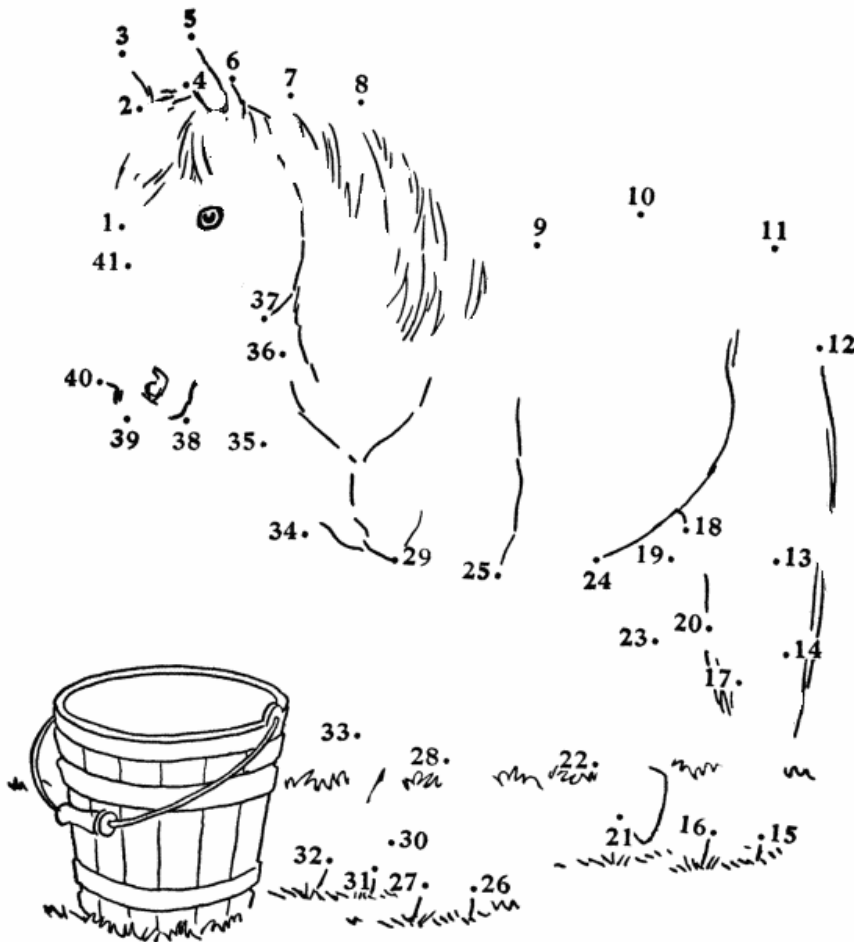


Are you patient? Sometimes waiting can be hard but when we do wait, our reward can be great. Harry knew that patience was important when he worked on the farm. It took a lot of patience to grow crops, but once grown they provided food for his family.

“I began to take great interest in the creation of things that come out of the ground.” Harry Truman
